Beset by a lean treasury, the salls cannot be filled to show the swiftness with which she can apply her speed, but "The Courier" will endeavor to make up for all her inceptional defections in other ways best able to serve the public and purposes.

With the ever increasing number of American born Jupanese in Seattle and the outlying districts, the fact is patent that there must be established some organ to be used as a medium in expression of their opinions and to guide them in the most commendable fashion, in their political actions as well as their social activities. That there is an argent necessity for identification with the political life of the lation by the second and ancoming reportations in who an obvious fact. The problem of how best to attain this object to a satisfactory degree has long been a problem and a bone of contention emong the leading Japanese thinkers of the first generation. Yes, how best to attain their end with justifiable and rational means has been a proof of distraction to these thinkers, for the simple reason that there were no indications signifying the trend of thought among the second generation. Always and at all times the second generation remained an element unfathomable, and their ideas and the trend of thought remained a puzzle that only time in its gradual evolutionary process cound solve. Yet the silent call was always there for some signal giving indication as to what channels of thought the mentality of the younger generation was running in:

It is high time now that that signal be given indicating the plat.

It is high time now that that signal be given indicating the platform upon which the second generation stands. The time has also larrived when the American born Jopanese must, take his rightly place in the life of the community and discharge his obligations and duties that were inherited by him as a natural born American citizen. Identification with the political life and the institutions of the national, state, and municipal governments has become a paramount obligation with him and that obligation with one of the country.

"The Courier" is given to understand that there has always been established in this community a sitzons' league to stimulate greater political action among the voting American-born Japanese. It is commendable that such an organization has already been formed in this community, and it can well-rest assured that it will receive the heartlest 50-operation from: "The Courier" on any measure or action that she deems will serve justly and genuinely the best interests of the American born Japanese and the community at large.

Let it be said in finale that no matter what the issues that confront this journal, its shall at all times voice its opinions regardless of factional politics, and take an independent stand, calling a spade a spade. There will be criticisms and protests that will arise from time to time as there ought to be and bound to be, and "The Courier" will see fit to print any written criticisms appoined they are within the bounds of common decency and calculations.
